AN ACT GENERALLY REVISING GUN LAWS; PROVIDING A LEGISLATIVE PURPOSE, INTENT, AND FINDINGS; PROVIDING LOCATIONS WHERE CONCEALED WEAPONS MAY BE CARRIED AND EXCEPTIONS; PROHIBITING THE MONTANA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM AND BOARD OF REGENTS FROM INFRINGING ON CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS AND PROVIDING EXCEPTIONS; PROVIDING A SEPARATE CIVIL CAUSE OF ACTION FOR VIOLATIONS OF THIS ACT; AMENDING SECTIONS 45-3-111, 45-8-316, 45-8-328, AND 45-8-351, MCA; REPEALING SECTIONS 45-8-317 AND 45-8-339, MCA; AND PROVIDING EFFECTIVE DATES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of [sections 1 through 11] is to enhance the safety of people by expanding their legal ability to provide for their own defense by reducing or eliminating government-mandated places where only criminals are armed and where citizens are prevented from exercising their fundamental right to defend themselves and others.

Section 2. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the legislature to reduce or remove provisions of law that limit or prohibit the ability of citizens to defend themselves by restricting with prior restraint the right to keep or bear arms that the people have reserved to themselves in the Montana constitution, and to further establish that the right to defense of a person's life, liberty, or property is a fundamental right.

Section 3. Legislative findings. The legislature declares and finds as follows:

(1) Nowhere in Article X, section 9(2)(a), of the Montana constitution is any power granted to amend, suspend, alter, or abolish the Montana constitution, nor is any power granted to affect or interfere with the rights the people have reserved to themselves specifically from interference by government entities and government



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actors in Article II of the Montana constitution.

(2) The Montana university system was created and is controlled by the Montana constitution and the land and buildings occupied by the university system are public property and not private property and are therefore clearly government entities.

(3) Any significant prohibition upon the possession of firearms at or on the various campuses of the Montana university system calls into question the rights that the people have reserved to protect themselves from government interference under Article II, section 12, of the Montana constitution.

(4) Zones where guns are prohibited provide an increased risk to the health and safety of citizens because these zones create an unreasonable expectation of government-provided safety, while that safety cannot be provided or ensured.

(5) In District of Columbia v. Heller, 554 U.S. 570 (2008), and McDonald v. City of Chicago, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), the United States supreme court affirmed that the second amendment to the United States constitution reserves to individuals the fundamental right to keep and bear arms for self-defense and is applicable as a restriction upon state and local governments and all political subdivisions of state and local government through the 14th amendment to the United States constitution.

Section 4. Where concealed weapon may be carried -- exceptions. A person with a current and valid permit issued pursuant to 45-8-321 or recognized pursuant to 45-8-329 may not be prohibited or restricted from exercising that permit anywhere in the state, except:

(1) in a correctional, detention, or treatment facility operated by or contracted with the department of corrections or a secure treatment facility operated by the department of public health and human services;

(2) in a detention facility or secure area of a law enforcement facility owned and operated by a city or county;

(3) at or beyond a security screening checkpoint regulated by the transportation security administration in a publicly owned, commercial airport;

(4) in a building owned and occupied by the United States;

(5) on a military reservation owned and managed by the United States;

(6) on private property where the owner of the property or the person who possesses or is in control

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of the property, including a tenant or lessee of the property, expressly prohibits firearms;

(7) within a courtroom or an area of a courthouse in use by court personnel pursuant to an order of a justice of the peace or judge; or

(8) in a school building as determined by a school board pursuant to 45-8-361.

Section 5. Prohibition on infringement of constitutional rights. The board of regents and all university system employees subject to the authority of the board of regents are prohibited from enforcing or coercing compliance with any rule or regulation that diminishes or restricts the rights of the people to keep or bear arms as reserved to them in Article II of the Montana constitution, especially those rights reserved in Article II, sections 4 through 12, notwithstanding any authority of the board of regents under Article X, section 9(2)(a), of the Montana constitution.

Section 6. Regulation of firearms prohibited for certain people -- exceptions. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), the board of regents and any unit of the university system may not regulate, restrict, or place an undue burden on the possession, transportation, or storage of firearms on or within university system property by a person eligible to possess a firearm under state or federal law and meeting the minimum safety and training requirements in_45-8-321(3).

(2) The board of regents or a unit of the university system may prohibit or regulate the following:

(a) the discharge of a firearm on or within university system property unless the discharge is done in self-defense;

(b) the removal of a firearm from a gun case or holster unless the removal is done in self-defense or within the domicile on campus of the lawful possessor of the firearm;

(c) the pointing of a firearm at another person unless the lawful possessor is acting in self-defense;

(d) the carrying of a firearm outside of a domicile on campus unless the firearm is within a case or holster;

(e) the failure to secure a firearm with a locking device whenever the firearm is not in the possession of or under the immediate control of the lawful possessor of the firearm;

(f) the possession or storage of a firearm in an on-campus dormitory or housing unit without the

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express permission of any roommate of the lawful possessor of the firearm;

(g) the possession or storage of a firearm by any individual who has a history of adjudicated university system discipline arising out of the individual's interpersonal violence or substance abuse;

(h) the possession of a firearm at an event on campus where campus authorities have authorized alcohol to be served and consumed; and

(i) the possession of a firearm at an athletic or entertainment event open to the public with controlled access and armed security on site.

Section 7. Remedy for violations Any person that suffers deprivation of rights enumerated under [sections 1 through 6] has a cause of action against any governmental entity, as defined in 2-9-101. The cause of action must be filed in district court. If a person asserting a deprivation of rights prevails, the person may be awarded reasonable costs, attorney fees, and damages.

Section 8. Section 45-3-111, MCA, is amended to read:

"45-3-111. Openly carrying weapon -- display -- exemption. (1) Any person who is not otherwise prohibited from doing so by federal or state law may openly carry a weapon and may communicate to another person the fact that the person has a weapon.

(2) If a person reasonably believes that the person or another person is threatened with bodily harm, the person may warn or threaten the use of force, including deadly force, against the aggressor, including drawing or presenting a weapon.

(3) This section does not limit the authority of the board of regents or other postsecondary institutions to regulate the carrying of weapons, as defined in 45-8-361(5)(b), on their campuses."

Section 9. Section 45-8-316, MCA, is amended to read:

"45-8-316. Carrying concealed firearms <u>-- exemption</u>. (1) A person who carries or bears concealed upon the individual's person a firearm shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500 or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding 6 months, or both.

(2) A person who has previously been convicted of an offense, committed on a different occasion

than the offense under this section, in this state or any other jurisdiction for which a sentence to a term of imprisonment in excess of 1 year could have been imposed and who carries or bears concealed upon the individual's person a firearm shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or be imprisoned in the state prison for a period not exceeding 5 years, or both.

(3) This section does not apply to a person eligible to possess a firearm under state or federal law."

Section 10. Section 45-8-328, MCA, is amended to read:

"45-8-328. Carrying concealed weapon in prohibited place -- penalty. (1) Except for <u>a person</u> issued a permit pursuant to 45-8-321 or a person recognized pursuant to 45-8-329 legislative security officers authorized to carry a concealed weapon in the state capitol as provided in 45-8-317(1)(k), a person commits the offense of carrying a concealed weapon in a prohibited place if the person purposely or knowingly carries a concealed weapon in:

(a) portions of a building used for state or local government offices and related areas in the building that have been restricted;

(b) a bank, credit union, savings and loan institution, or similar institution during the institution's normal business hours. It is not an offense under this section to carry a concealed weapon while:

(i) using an institution's drive-up window, automatic teller machine, or unstaffed night depository; or

(ii) at or near a branch office of an institution in a mall, grocery store, or other place unless the person is inside the enclosure used for the institution's financial services or is using the institution's financial services.

(c) a room in which alcoholic beverages are sold, dispensed, and consumed under a license issued under Title 16 for the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises.

(2) It is not a defense that the person had a valid permit to carry a concealed weapon. A person convicted of the offense shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a term not to exceed 6 months or fined an amount not to exceed \$500, or both."

Section 11. Section 45-8-351, MCA, is amended to read:

"45-8-351. Restriction on local government regulation of firearms. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), a county, city, town, consolidated local government, or other local government unit may not



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prohibit, register, tax, license, or regulate the purchase, sale or other transfer (including delay in purchase, sale, or other transfer), ownership, possession, transportation, use, or unconcealed carrying of any weapon, including a rifle, shotgun, handgun, or concealed handgun.

(2) (a) For public safety purposes, a city or town may regulate the discharge of rifles, shotguns, and handguns. A county, city, town, consolidated local government, or other local government unit has power to prevent and suppress the carrying of unpermitted concealed weapons or the carrying of unconcealed weapons to a publicly owned and occupied building under its jurisdiction.

(b) Nothing contained in this section allows any government to prohibit the legitimate display of firearms at shows or other public occasions by collectors and others or to prohibit the legitimate transportation of firearms through any jurisdiction, whether in airports or otherwise.

(c) A local ordinance enacted pursuant to this section may not prohibit a legislative security officer who has been issued a concealed weapon permit from carrying a concealed weapon in the state capitol as provided in 45-8-317."

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 12. Repealer. The following sections of the Montana Code Annotated are repealed:

45-8-317. Exceptions.

45-8-339. Carrying firearms on train -- penalty.

Section 13. Severability. If a part of [this act] is invalid, all valid parts that are severable from the invalid part remain in effect. If a part of [this act] is invalid in one or more of its applications, the part remains in effect in all valid applications that are severable from the invalid applications.

Section 14. Codification instruction. [Sections 1 through 7] are intended to be codified as an integral part of Title 45, chapter 8, part 3, and the provisions of Title 45, chapter 8, part 3, apply to [sections 1 through 7].

Section 15. Effective dates. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), [this act] is effective on



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passage and approval.

(2) [Section 6] is effective June 1, 2021.

MONTANA BOARD OF REGENTS OF HIGHER EDUCATION Policy and Procedures Manual

SUBJECT: PHYSICAL PLANT Policy 1006 – Security and Law Enforcement Operations Adopted: November 18, 1999: Revised: May 25, 2012

Board policy:

A. The president, chancellor or dean of each campus of the Montana University System shall have general control and direction of the police or security department of his or her campus in accordance with the policies of the Board of Regents of Higher Education. A campus may contract with private security companies for the provision of security services.

B. Except as provided in subsection C, only the following may carry firearms on or at any campus of the Montana University System:

1. those persons who are acting in the capacity of police or security department officers and who:

- a. have successfully completed the basic course in law enforcement conducted by the Montana Law Enforcement Academy or an equivalent course conducted by another state agency and recognized as such by the Crime Control Division of the Montana Department of Justice; or;
- b. have passed the state approved equivalency examination administered by the Montana Law Enforcement Academy; and

2. those persons who are employees of a contracted private security company and who are registered to carry firearms pursuant to Title 37, Chapter 60, MCA.

C. Each campus may establish regulations governing the transportation and storage of firearms on campus.

AN ACT APPROPRIATING MONEY TO VARIOUS STATE AGENCIES FOR THE BIENNIUM ENDING JUNE 30, 2023; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

Section 1. Short title. [This act] may be cited as "The General Appropriations Act of 2021".

Section 2. First level expenditures. The agency and program appropriation tables in the legislative fiscal analyst narrative accompanying this bill, showing first level expenditures and funding for the 2023 biennium, are adopted as legislative intent.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of [this act] is for any reason held unconstitutional, the decision does not affect the validity of the remaining portions of [this act].

Section 4. Appropriation control. An appropriation item designated "Biennial" may be spent in either year of the biennium. An appropriation item designated "Restricted" may be used during the biennium only for the purpose designated by its title and as presented to the legislature. An appropriation item designated "One Time Only" or "OTO" may not be included in the present law base for the 2025 biennium. The office of budget and program planning shall establish a separate appropriation on the statewide accounting, budgeting, and human resource system for any item designated "Biennial", "Restricted", "One Time Only", or "OTO". The office of budget and program planning shall establish at least one appropriation on the statewide accounting, budgeting, and human resource system for any appropriation that appears as a separate line item in [this act].

Section 5. Appropriation control. The office of budget and program planning shall establish a separate appropriation on the statewide accounting, budgeting, and human resource system for the funding included in each executive branch agency's budget to pay fixed cost allocations for the state information technology services division of the department of administration. The appropriations must be designated as restricted.

Section 6. Program definition. As used in [this act], "program", which has the same meaning as defined in 17-7-102, is consistent with the management and accountability structure established on the statewide accounting, budgeting, and human resource system, and is identified as a major subdivision of an agency ordinally numbered with an Arabic numeral.

Section 7. Personal services funding -- 2025 biennium. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), present law and new proposal funding budget requests for the 2023 biennium



submitted under Title 17, chapter 7, part 1, by each executive, judicial, and legislative branch agency must include funding of first level personal services separate from funding of other expenditures. The funding of first level personal services by fund or equivalent for each fiscal year must be shown at the fourth reporting level or equivalent in the budget request for the 2025

biennium submitted by November 1 to the legislative fiscal analyst by the office of budget and program planning.

(2) The provisions of subsection (1) do not apply to the Montana university system.

Section 8. Budget amendment eligibility. If a state special revenue fund is specifically identified and referenced in [section 11] and eligible for budget amendments in the 2023 biennium, the base budget for the 2025 biennium will be established using the higher of the fiscal year 2023 biennium appropriation in House Bill No. 2 or the fiscal year 2022 actual expenditure level to include expenditures associated with budget amendments as defined in Senate Bill No. 191.

Section 9. Totals not appropriations. The totals shown in [this act] are for informational purposes only and are not appropriations.

Section 10. Effective date. [This act] is effective July 1, 2021.

Section 11. Appropriations. The following money is appropriated for the respective fiscal years:

General fund money, state and federal special revenue, and proprietary fund revenue appropriated to the Board of Regents are included in all Montana University System programs. All other public funds received by units of the Montana University System (other than plant funds appropriated in HB 5, relating to long-range building) are appropriated to the Board of Regents and may be expended under the provisions of 17-7-138(2), MCA. The Board of Regents shall allocate the appropriations to individual university system units, as defined in 17-7-102(13), MCA, according to board policy.

The Montana University System, except for the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education and the community colleges, shall provide the Office of Budget and Program Planning and the Legislative Fiscal Division banner access to the entire university system's information system, except for information pertaining to individual students and individual employees that is protected by Article II, sections 9 and 10, of the Montana Constitution, 20-25-515, MCA, or the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. 1232g.

The Montana University System shall provide the electronic data required for entering human resource data for the current unrestricted operating funds into the Internet Budgeting and Reporting System (IBARS). The salary and benefit data provided must reflect approved Board of Regents operating budgets.

The average budgeted amount for each full-time equivalent student at the community colleges, includes \$3,264 for each year of the 2023 biennium. The general fund appropriation for OCHE – Community College Assistance provides 48.2% in FY 2022 and 48.2% in FY 2023 of the budget amount for each full-time equivalent student each year of the 2023 biennium. The remaining 51.8% of the budget amount for each full-time equivalent student must be paid from funds other than those appropriated for OCHE – Community College Assistance.

The commissioner may adjust the funding distribution between community colleges based on actual enrollment.

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Funding to be transferred to the state energy conservation program debt service account for energy improvements are as follows. Transferred funding for each year of the biennium to retire bonded projects are MSU Northern \$16,700 in FY 2022 and \$16,200 in FY 2023, MSU Billings \$45,519, and Great Falls \$86,500. Funding to be transferred for each year of the biennium for state energy revolving projects are MSU Billings \$55,323, MSU Northern \$64,576, Miles Community College \$23,553, and University of Montana \$294,875. are \$277,611 in FY 2022 and \$254,753 in FY 2023.

Total audit costs are estimated to be \$242,498 for the community colleges for the biennium. The general fund appropriation for each community college provides 48.2% of the total audit costs in the 2023 biennium. The remaining 51.8% of these costs must be paid from funds other than those appropriated from OCHE – Community College Assistance – Legislative Audit. Audit costs charged to the community colleges for the biennium may not exceed \$66,388 for Flathead Valley Community College, \$86,994 for Miles Community College, and \$89,116 for Dawson Community College. Total audit cost for OCHE/BOR \$66,816, UM-Missoula \$301,752, and MSU-Bozeman \$301,752.

The Montana University System shall pay \$109,276 for the 2023 biennium in current funds in support of the Montana Natural Resource Information System (NRIS) located at the Montana State Library. Quarterly payments must be made on receipt of the bills from the state library, up to the total appropriated.

The general fund appropriation for Community College Assistance is calculated to fund education in the community colleges for an estimated 2,050 resident FTE in FY 2022 and 2,109 in FY 2023. If total resident FTE student enrollment in the community colleges is greater than the estimated number for the biennium, the community colleges shall serve the additional students without a state general fund contribution. If actual resident FTE student enrollment is less than the estimated numbers for the biennium, the community colleges shall revert general fund money to the state in accordance with 17-7-142.

Implementation of HB 102 is restricted to the provision of full implementation of open and concealed carry of firearms on the Montana University System campuses, including but not limited to firearms training, metal detectors for events, gun safes for campus resident housing, or awareness campaigns. If the Montana University System files a lawsuit contesting the legality of HB 102, Implementation of HB 102 is void.

Charge of Task Force

Assess student mental health services and suicide prevention efforts throughout the Montana University System and develop best practices and make recommendations for improvement.



Task Force Background

- 24 member task force all MUS campuses represented
- Practitioners, faculty, staff, students and administrators
- Monthly conference calls
- Five work groups within the task force and included broader representation
 - Early Intervention Efforts, Primary Care, Screenings and Assessment Tools
 - Common Training, Awareness, Education and Collaboration
 - Suicide Prevention Summit Planning
 - Reduced Access to Lethal Means
 - Data



Task Force Objectives

- Develop and host a statewide summit on suicide prevention
- Conduct assessments of current practices and policies and recommend changes and improvements
- Develop best practices and common training approaches that can be shared and followed by campuses



Findings

- The Task Force administered two surveys to campuses.
 - The first survey was used to develop an inventory of suicide prevention training programs provided to faculty, staff and students
 - The second survey detailed the mental health services provided by campuses.
- Campuses provide significant services to students for mental health needs, but there is not one model used by all campuses to provide student mental health services.
- Campuses have seen a significant increase (16% over the last five years) in utilization of mental health services.
- Campuses do not have adequate staffing or resources to address the need for services.
- Campuses are not meeting national standards for staffing of 1 counselor per 1000-1500 students, the MUS is at 1 counselor per 1800 students.
- Montana has the highest suicide rate in the nation.

Recommendation 1: Each MUS campus should have a licensed mental health clinician on staff or have readily available through contract services (counselor, social worker, psychologist, mental health nurse practitioner, mental health physician assistant, or psychiatrist) with new funding provided for campuses that do not currently have licensed clinicians on staff to assist with accurate diagnosis, effective treatment, and appropriate follow-up.

Recommendation 2: The MUS and campuses should establish guidelines to ensure appropriate individuals and groups are receiving evidence-based suicide prevention training.



Recommendation 3: The MUS and campuses should develop a formal process by which staff across campuses can consult with each other about programming and services.

Recommendation 4: MUS campuses that provide medical care on campus should adhere to the recommendations outlined in the United States Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) report on depression screening.

Recommendation 5: MUS campuses should complete the depression screening survey to establish baseline practices, obstacles to implementation, needed resources, and later complete a follow up survey to measure outcomes.



Recommendation 6: The MUS should provide necessary resources, including compulsory ongoing training for mental health professionals and the formation of a depression screening consortium to encourage implementation and overcome obstacles.

Recommendation 7: Conduct assessments of campus environments to assess the access to lethal means to attempt suicide; create services/policies to help reduce access to lethal means; review policies and practices related to prescription drugs, access to heights and firearms.

Recommendation 8: Review potential programs and policies that could enhance student safety and implement a systemwide protocol and tracking system for suicide attempts and completions.



Recommendation 9: Increase partnerships with other mental health and suicide prevention stakeholders, increasing communication between all involved, developing efficiencies and best practices and sharing resources to combat student mental health issues and suicide from a holistic approach.

Recommendation 10: The MUS should explore funding/resource availability and determine funding sources to increase mental health services to students.

Recommendation 11: The MUS should host a biennial summit on student mental health and suicide prevention.



Conclusion

- Significant efforts are conducted on campuses throughout the Montana University System to address student mental health needs, including suicide prevention.
- Campus stakeholders are interested in providing additional services and developing best practices and collaborative approaches but are limited due to resources and need additional funding in order to increase services.
- The Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education should lead the system-wide efforts and provide guidance, structure and leadership in development of additional programming and services.
